After a relatively moderate winter we welcome summer, with all the enjoyment and possibilities it offers. This summer will be an especially busy and exciting time for our Town with many major projects including:

- Construction of the roads, active transportation, water, sewer, and stormwater systems, as well as a future solar array as part of the Community Campus development. Building of the new high school by the Province of PEI will also begin over the next few months.
- As part of the Community Campus development, we look forward to concrete plans and timelines for a new junior high school recently announced by Premier Dennis King.
- The Michael Thomas Waterfront Park will see a new boardwalk constructed and the site opened for public use.
- Work will recommence to restore the Kelly's Pond watershed, including Moore's Pond to its former pristine beauty by dredging and improving water quality and flow.
- A new water tower will be constructed to meet the fresh water needs of our growing Town.
- The Gray Group's Crossroads development zoning and bylaw changes have been approved by Council, so we are looking forward to construction beginning soon on the initial phase of this billion-dollar project.

#### What's New?

- Both the Town and Utility budgets were passed in March. There were no tax increases to residential or commercial rates.
- Stratford received a very prestigious Climate Change Mitigation award at a recent Federation of Canadian Municipalities Conference in Ottawa. I was very honoured to accept the award, along with Councillor Gordie Cox, Sustainability Chair, and former Sustainability Coordinator for the Town of Stratford, Katie Sonier.
- CMHC has awarded the Town \$1.1 million to find ways to address the current national housing crisis by identifying barriers to development. The project, called Shape Stratford, aims to simplify, and rationalize the approval process to get needed housing in place as quickly as possible. We hope you will join in the conversation every chance you get.

I am very grateful to Council, Staff, and residents for the continued success our Town enjoys as we work together to minimize environmental impacts and maximize opportunities for making Stratford the best place to live, work and play.

I look forward to seeing residents at various upcoming activities, in particular on Canada Day when we again come together to celebrate not only our fabulous country, but also our wonderful community!

### > Utility

#### SUBDIVISIONS

Developers in Stratford are required to install sewer and water systems during development, and when tested and approved, the Utility takes over the systems. Recently, the Utility took over the infrastructure of Kelly Height Phase 2 and Greenway Heights Phase 2, these subdivisions have close to 70 additional serviced units when fully developed. This summer, extensions are proposed in Clearview Estates, Reddin Meadows and Foxwood Flourish subdivision, while several other developments are in the concept phase.

#### SEWER LIFT STATION UPGRADES

The Utility has tendered to upgrade the Corish Sewer lift station located at the Kinlock/Keppoch Road intersection. Contractors hope to complete work late this year, pending the availability and delivery of materials. Work will involve a new wet well, valving and a standby generator.

Upgrades to the Bunbury sewer lift station will also take place. This work will involve new pumps, new controls and a stand-by generator.

#### PLEASE NOTE:

Sump pumps <u>cannot</u> be connected to the municipal sewer system as stated in the Town's Water and Sewer Customer Service Regulations Bylaw. It is illegal to discharge any storm water, surface water, roof run-off, surface drainage, subsurface drainage, foundation drainage, or water used for heating or cooling into the Town's sewer system.

#### WATER RESERVOIR PROJECT

This year the Utility will install an additional water storage reservoir beside the existing reservoir on Georgetown Road, with work is expected to be completed this fall.

Please note that the Town's water system is operated and maintained to Provincial standards, and water is tested by staff regularly and as required.



#### > Public Works Department

#### MAINTENANCE

Staff are busy with spring grass cutting, property and building maintenance, installing and relocating temporary speed humps, maintaining trails and other daily duties.

Contractors have already begun work to relocate and restore the old storage barn at Cotton Park to help increase parking in that area. Following this, the plan is to repave at Cotton Center as well as a portion of the parking lot at the Stratford Town Centre this year. Heat pump energy additions will happen at the Town maintenance building on Hollis Avenue and Stratford Road. Pending funding, energy retrofits are planned for the youth/seniors building in Cotton Park and solar panels at the Emergency Service Center and Town maintenance building. The electric car charging station on Shepard Drive will also be upgraded. The Town has tendered and hopes to purchase an electric car and a Town maintenance truck to replace one of the older fleet trucks.

#### ACTIVE TRANSPORTATION

The Town is currently updating our 2010 Active Transportation Plan. Consultants and staff have engaged the public and stakeholders for feedback and are planning a public open house to review the consultants' draft plan when it is complete.

The Town has been fortunate to share funding with the Province of PEI and Trans Canada Trail to install a new

multi-purpose paved path on Kinlock Road from the Trans-Canada highway to JK Beauty Lane, and we recently tendered to pave the Trans Canada Trail along Hollis Avenue and MacIntosh Drive. The final scope of paving will be determined by tender pricing.

As part of the Community Campus project, the Town will begin the installation of a 2 km multi-purpose paved and lighted path from Bunbury Road to Hollis Avenue.

We want to thank our funding partners at Trans-Canada Trail and the Province of PEI for their continued support of the development of the Town's Active Transportation network.

#### SPEED SIGNS/SPEED HUMPS

Staff have been busy installing temporary speed humps throughout Stratford. In our ongoing effort to reduce speeding in Town. We continue to purchase speed radar signs and speed humps. Last year, the Town initiated a new process for requesting a temporary speed hump, where any person requesting one must fill out a written request for which guidelines must be met for final approval. #### TOWN ROADS STREET AND DITCH INFILLING

The Province of PEI owns all roads, streets, and ditches in Stratford. Provincial crews are already cleaning up from winter plow, salt, and stormwater damage, and are also busy patching potholes and installing or replacing culverts.

Please note that any request to infill your ditch or replace a raised culvert can be directed to the Pro vincial Department of Highways.

#### UPDATE ON POST-TROPICAL STORM FIONA CLEANUP EFFORTS

The following information may be helpful to residents as provincial maintenance crews and private contractors continue cleanup:

- Provincial crews have worked throughout the winter on cleanup and have approximately 450 properties remaining of 6,100 applications in PEI (as of April 2023). Those properties will be cleaned up this spring and potentially into the summer.
- The province will offer curbside pick-up of large debris, such as tree branches, until June 30, 2023. The Town of Stratford is unable to provide any drop-off locations in the community at this time. Residents can place debris near the curb for pick-up while ensuring it does not impede the road.
- Sixteen pits are open across the island for Islanders to bring Fiona debris free of charge.
- Residents may take Fiona debris to any of the IWMC Waste Watch Drop-Off Centres Island-wide. Standard fees apply.





## DANGEROUS AND UNSIGHTLY PREMISES BYLAW

Did you know property owners are required to upkeep and maintain their property yearround whether the property owner lives there or rents out the property? This includes (but is not limited to) keeping the grass cut and ensuring waste is not left unattended on the property.

## WHERE CAN YOU FIND BYLAW INFORMATION?

A copy of the Building Bylaw, application forms, and Fee Bylaw can be found on the Town's website, or you can pick up copies in person at the Planning Department, located within Stratford Town Centre.

### > The Building Bylaw and National Building Code

In the spring of 2020, the Town of Stratford adopted a new Building Bylaw (Bylaw #50), which included the adoption of the 2015 National Building Code and the 2017 National Energy Code of Canada for Buildings. The Building Bylaw is enforced through scheduled inspections during construction at various stages of completion. These inspections will verify work against the approved submitted plans and against the NBCC.

Any new application for a single detached development requires the following information:

- Development Application Form
- Utility Application Form
- Entrance Way Application Form
- Completed Deck Pamphlet (if using

### > Development Permits

Helical Piles, an engineer stamped helical pile design is required)

- Building Plans, including, floor plans, elevations, and crosssection
- Truss Package, including, layout and engineer-stamped truss shop drawings
- Site Grading Plan prepared by a certified surveyor
- Letter of Authorization (if applying on behalf of the landowner)
- Any required engineering for steel beams or columns, or tall walls

\*\*\* Please note that preliminary plans will no longer be accepted\*\*\*

To ensure that your permit is ready in time for your project start date, please submit your complete application as early as possible to allow staff time to process it. Missing documents may cause delays in processing your permit.

From January to March 2023, the Planning Department has issued a total of 24 development permits. The following Table shows a summary of development activities between January and March 2023.

# PLANNING, DEVELOPMENT AND HERITAGE UPDATE

### > Crossroads Core Area Development



On April 12, 2023, Stratford Town Council granted approval to the Gray Group for two new Zones to be created and for an amendment to the Zoning & Development Bylaw #45. The two new zones will be: Urban Core (UC) and Core Mixed Use (CMU), pending approval from the Province of PEI. These two new zones would change portions of the existing Town Centre Core Area (TCC) and Mason Road Core Area (MRC) zones allowing for taller buildings with first floor commercial and residential and/ or office uses above - CMU would allow for heights up to 25 metres, and UC would allow for up to 37 metres.

A change to the development application process is also included within these two new zones which will see the Town of Stratford using formbased code methodology.



The form-based code process sees standards built into the bylaw which removes the need for individual applications to go forward to council, streamlining the process for the developer, staff, and council.

The new zones preserve commercial space by using a majority of mixeduse building requirements, while also adding needed residential units to the market. Some other highlights of the proposed form-based code requirements are:

- A move to more underground parking and lowering of the required total number of parking spaces. As well as increased standards for bicycle parking and streetscapes, including sidewalks and AT Paths. Over time this will encourage more active transportation, including use of transit by residents and visitors, more consideration for bicycle parking, and other greener transportation options.
- Required step backs start at 3 storeys depending on the zone and building location. Step backs serve several purposes including providing wind breaks, adding interest to the building design while also limiting the appearance of the height of the building from streetscape, and reducing shadowing.
- Building articulation is used in form-based code to ensure that architectural style such as wall breaks, facade materials, recessed and projection areas, roof changes, distinct colour schemes and roof treatments, etc. are applied and a uniform design of buildings is not used.
- Several architectural materials will be prohibited in the CMU zone for multi-unit or mixed-use housing including the following exterior finishes: vinyl siding, plastic, plywood, unfinished concrete, exterior insulation and finish systems where stucco is applied to rigid insulation, and darkly tinted or mirrored glass, except for spandrel glass panels.
- All buildings with a flat roof will provide no less than 30% of the roof area as soft landscaping. These landscaped areas may not be fully accessible by building tenants but may be included as part of their required common spaces.

# Landscape requirements in the CMU zone

 Any portion of a front, flanking, side, or rear yard that is not used for driveways, parking, off-street loading spaces, walkways, wheelchair ramps, stairs, or accessory structures shall be hard landscaped or soft landscaped.

- Invasive or highly toxic plant species are prohibited as soft landscaping material and native plants are preferred.
- Trees shall be planted at a rate of not less than 2.5 (60mm caliper) or greater per every 500 m<sup>2</sup> of ground floor area of the building and trees in parking lots shall include 1 tree per island if parking lot exceeds 24 cars.

On November 3, 2022, 280 letters were mailed to all property owners within 150 metres of the boundaries of the proposed properties to be rezoned and a subsequent public meeting was held on November 23, 2022, which was open to all members of the public to attend in person, watch live or view the recording. Through the public meeting and subsequent period for feedback, The Gray Group have worked to address many of the concerns received, altering their plan to address and make changes where they could.

The Crossroads plan will be developed through phases, expected to occur over the next twenty years. The construction estimates are approximately \$1 billion, with an estimated 2.635 residential units and 300,000 sq. ft. of commercial and light industrial space. By increasing the density and constructing some buildings higher, the development requires only 2.9 kilometres of new roads to be constructed for this amount of residential and commercial development. This is a significant reduction in roadways needed, based on a traditional build of singlefamily homes to accommodate the same number of units. The plan also includes a central urban park and multi-use trail development.



# PERMISSIONS TO USE TOWN FACILITIES

Groups and individuals who want to use Town facilities (which includes parks, playgrounds, and playing fields) for any reason must fill out an application and obtain permission from the recreation department. Town parks include all neighborhood parks and playgrounds as well as our major parks; Tea Hill Park, Pondside Park, Kinlock Park, Robert L. Cotton Memorial Park. and Fullerton's Creek Conservation Park. Town facilities include Stratford **Emergency Services Centre, Stratford** Town Centre, MacNeill Community Centre, Bunbury Rink Building and Cotton Park buildings. Town facilities are available to groups or individuals on a priority basis.

#### > Stratford Gymnasium Track Direction and Rules

Lanes at the track are for walking and running. Directions for walking/running change daily – these are posted every day by the entrance to the track. We ask that users do not walk more than two people wide in the walking lane so that faster walkers may pass in the outside lane (running lane) when traffic allows. Indoor footwear is required.

Young children MUST be directly supervised by an adult if using the gymnasium track. The fitness area (equipment only) is restricted to those 15 years and older.

Please remember that all Town of Stratford facilities are SCENT-FREE.



# **DID YOU KNOW?**

Stratford has nearly 38 km of trail throughout town to complement the 20 km of sidewalk and 40 km of roadside bike lanes. These trails are a mix of natural, paved or gravel, over public and private lands. We encourage residents to use them for walking, jogging, biking, and hiking. STEP 5: Fill out our 'Stratford Connects Sign-up Form' online and select 'submit' to complete your sign-up process electronically.




#### Stratford recently released its updated Greenhouse Gas Inventory!



In 2022, Stratford updated its community-wide inventory of greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions, as part of the Community Energy Plan. Stratford's GHG inventory tracks the direct and indirect emissions of four key sectors: residential buildings, commercial buildings, transportation, and waste. The inventory also tracks all emissions caused by municipal operations. Recording annual emissions is key in informing the Town's energy and climate policy. # INTERESTING FACT!

In 2021 Stratford's community emissions were 8.7% lower than 2015, or approximately 88,000 tonnes of CO2e emissions! Emissions in 2020 and 2021 were dramatically impacted by COVID-19 nationwide and are beginning to rise again to pre-pandemic levels. Continued climate actions and programs will be critical in reaching Stratford's climate targets. Residential homes were the largest emissions source, followed closely by the transportation sector.

### > Easy and Best Garden/ Landscape practices for spring and summer

By now, we hope that the spring sun is shining, the grass is growing, and the leaves are unfurling. Spring garden chores can sometimes feel overwhelming with so much to do, but remember, spring turns into summer, so there is lots of time.

Early spring is a great time to continue pruning trees and shrubs as well as cleaning up debris from last year's perennial growth. When pruning shrubs, it is essential to prune early flowering shrubs such as Lilacs, Forsythia and Rhododendrons until their blooms have passed.

If you want to increase blooms on your trees and shrubs and yield in your vegetable/herb gardens, consider growing plants that attract pollinators/beneficial insects such as ladybugs and bees. Plant wildflower seed mixes and grow perennial plants such as perennial salvia, catmint, and coneflower; this will ensure an abundance of blooms and increase yield and fruit production.

As our seasons continue to be hot and dry, consider growing plants that are drought tolerant, which also reduces the need for overconsumption of water. Examples of drought-resistant/tolerant plants are Lavender, Coneflower, and Perennial Salvia. These drought-resistant plants also attract beneficial insects, serving a dual purpose!

If you need to water during a dry spell, it is best done in the morning and apply a generous amount of water once every couple of days. It will saturate the soil more and encourage a deeper root resulting in an overall healthy plant. Shallow watering will only promote a shallow root, limiting top growth and, in turn, using more water. The plants will tell you what they need based on how they grow, whether they are trees, shrubs, perennials, vegetables, annual flowers, or herbs. Always remember to plant in their optimal environment, and they will thrive.

Happy spring and summer growing, and remember to just enjoy your outdoor space!

# **DIVERSITY AND INCLUSION**

Town of Stratford is a welcoming and inclusive community, and in this edition of Town Talk, we would like to recognize our **Ugandan** community members and celebrate their rich culture.

Uganda is one of the most diverse countries in Africa. Uganda's rich cultural heritage stems from a blend of traditions, customs, and practices from over 60 ethnic groups and 30 different languages. The three main linguistic groups are the Bantu, the Nilotic, and the Central Sudanic.

Here are some interesting facts about Ugandan customs, along with some great conversation starters:

- Ugandans greet each other elaborately. A handshake is the most appropriate in greeting situations. However, with those they are well acquainted with, Ugandans may converse while holding on to their hand as an extension of the handshake and a way of connecting with the person.
- Traditional Ugandan dress is often brightly coloured and patterned, reflecting the country's vibrant culture. Ugandan men wear kanzu, a white robe that reaches the ground, and women wear a busuti or gomesi, a colourful floor-length dress with a square neck and puffed sleeve tied with a sash below the waist.DYK? Ugandan men almost always wear long pants, even in the hottest weather.
- Some of the most popular dishes in Uganda are matooke (a type of plantain/green bananas), groundnut sauce, and ugali (a type of maize porridge). Some of their specialties (for discerning palates) include Nsenene (fried grasshoppers) and Nswaa (fried white ants). DYK? Walking over bowls, saucepans or pots containing food is considered rude in Uganda.

- Some of their common drinks include pombe or malwa (from fermented millet and banana) and waragi (from banana). Chai-style tea is also popular, as is coffee, with Uganda being the largest coffee producer in Africa (Robusta and Arabica being two of the well-known varieties).
- Ugandans love dancing and their cultural diversity is reflected in their music and dance, with each tribe having their traditional dances. They dance to vibrant music and celebrate ceremonies, rituals, and traditional practices with dance.
- Uganda's cultural heritage also includes traditional crafts such as basket weaving, pottery, and woodcarving, creating beautiful and intricate pieces representing the country's unique identity.
- One of Uganda's most significant cultural heritage sites is the Kasubi Tombs, a UNESCO World Heritage Site. The Kasubi Tombs are the burial grounds for the kings of the Buganda Kingdom, and they represent the spiritual and political center of the Kingdom.

We are excited to share that our project "Rehabilitation of the Fullerton's Creek Watershed" was funded by Environment and Climate Change Canada's EcoAction Community Funding Program. We have been awarded \$48,190 over a period of three years ending March 31, 2025. Our project focuses on increasing understanding of the importance of freshwater and improving water quality in the Fullerton's Creek Watershed.

Our work will include conducting stream work, including removing debris and managing invasive species, planting native trees, shrubs, and herbaceous species within the riparian zone, and conducting educational activities, including social media campaigns, interpretive walks, and installing an interpretive panel. In addition, we will be conducting monitoring activities including water quality monitoring and plant survival surveys.

# RCMP IN STRATFORD

> Stratford RCMP note resurgence of Grandparent scams



Across the country RCMP are dealing with individuals who have been preyed upon by someone pretending to be a loved one being hurt or in trouble. These "emergency scams", more commonly known as Grandparent scams, see the scammers claiming to be someone you know and that they need money from you right away.

Often scammers will claim they've been arrested and need bail money, or they've been in a car accident, or they are having trouble getting home from a foreign country. Contact can be made by phone call, text, or even email messages. Most of the time scammers will ask for cash, but they may also demand gift cards.

These fraudsters may claim to be law enforcement officials, lawyers or try to impersonate a family member. Be aware, they may also tell you not to speak to anyone else about their situation. Increasingly, the scammer will tell you someone will come to your home to pick up cash or ask you to send it in the mail. If you receive a call like this, try and verify the identity of the person with very specific questions; better yet, hang up and call the person back with a number you know to be theirs if you can. If the fraudster claims to be law enforcement, hang up and call your local police directly using a known, reputable number. Be very suspicious of anyone asking you to act immediately and send them cash. If it doesn't sound right, it probably isn't!

To report a theft, or if you see suspicious activity, please contact Stratford RCMP at 902-367-9300 or call 9 1 1 if it is an emergency.



Leap pays tribute to the ecology and fauna associated with pond ecosystems. The installation is of one of the most ubiquitous pond side creatures, frogs, and their place in childhood fantasy narratives. Through the use of leaping art, the artist wanted to frame them as dynamic amphibians that bridge the aquatic and terrestrial worlds, and have them engaging playfully with the audience.

The structure of the two frogs is from laminated pressure treated wood that was carved into amphibian shapes. The skin of the frogs is from hammered copper. The base of the structure includes blown glass embedded to resemble air bubbles that form from movement in a pond.






### **DO YOUR RESEARCH BEFORE** PURCHASING **PLANTS ONLINE!**



A key word to be aware of is "groundcover". If a plant can cover much of the ground space in your garden, it may be an invasive species. Some common examples of invasive often sold as groundcovers are goutweed (Aegopodium podagraria) and periwinkle (Vinca minor). Many invasives are readily available for purchase online. Remember, if a plant is considered invasive in another jurisdiction, it may also become an invader here!

Please do not leave pets in a parked car. Parked cars can quickly reach deadly temperatures and with a dog's normal body temperature about 39 degrees, just 5 minutes in the car can rise their temperature to cause irreparable brain damage or even death.
