MAYOR'S MESSAGE

Happy New Year! We welcome the new year with great hope and anticipation as we continue to strive to make Stratford the best community possible.

It was so great to see construction begin in 2023 on our new community campus, waterfront park, new active transportation paths, a new water tower, and many other long-awaited projects.

The Gray Group is beginning the development and building of downtown Stratford as evidenced by several major construction projects in the Town Core area they have underway. We know that many in our community are eagerly awaiting both the housing and commercial development they have planned.

Council, management team members, and I held a priority setting exercise in the fall and have worked together to identify what we see as the Town's major priorities for the next three years. Currently, we are working on an operational plan which will be closely linked to the 2024/2025 budget and the long-term forecast to determine the impact on budgets for the following two years with these priorities in mind.

Our budget consultation will take place in coming weeks and further information from our priority setting exercise will be shared with residents at this time. You will also be asked for input to the draft 2024/25 Town budget and to respond to the Annual Resident Survey. Please take part in both of these opportunities as they provide valuable feedback to us.

The Shape Stratford Project is nearing completion and has been a great means of identifying how the Town can reduce barriers to construction, which in turn can help put in place adequate, affordable and attainable housing. We have been working closely with developers, residents, municipal partners, Federal and Provincial government representatives, and social and co-op housing advocates and service groups to address this pressing need in our Town. Through a great deal of analysis, research and discussion, barriers to development have been identified and solutions proposed. Conversations will continue in our community, particularly as we complete a review of the Town's Official Plan and the Planning and Development Bylaw.

Over these winter months, I encourage you to find ways and places to connect with others, it can be easy to stay indoors but social isolation is a big issue for many in our community. Volunteer, join a club, call a friend, and check in on one another. Although the winter can be long, there are many ways we can enjoy the numerous social and recreational activities available within the Town. Thank you for everything you have done to make our community better in 2023.

I wish you and your families all the very best in 2024.

> Infrastructure Projects

Infrastructure staff are busy closing out 2023 projects while preparing for a busy 2024 season. Ongoing Stratford Utility projects from 2023 include upgrades to the Corish sewer lift station at the corner of Keppoch Road and Kinlock Road, an additional water reservoir on Georgetown Road, generator backup power at the Bunbury Road sewer lift station, concrete floor installation in our dry storage building on Hollis Avenue and an additional transit shelter on Bunbury Road.

The Utility added water and sewer infrastructure from Kelly Heights Phase 2 in 2023 and the Greensview subdivision on the Stratford Road, across from Moores pond. Utility staff now monitor and maintain a water and sewer system comprising of 90 kilometers of sewer main, 1302 sewer manholes, 29 sewer lift stations, 4 water stations and a reservoir, 85 kilometers of water main, 648 water main valves, 312 hydrants and valves and finally close to 3200 residential and commercial water meters.

As development continues in 2024, several new subdivisions are in the concept, design or construction phase. Staff will be busy over the coming weeks removing Christmas decorations, preparing equipment for the summer and completing maintenance and repairs inside our buildings.

> Public Works

The dry storage barn at Cotton Park was relocated and upgraded in 2023. Electrical power was installed at the community gardens site for holiday lighting and other events. Additionally, the Town added a rear mount backhoe attachment for the Town tractor. The parking lot paving was completed at Cotton Park, the Town Hall and at the Town maintenance facility

> Sidewalks Trails Bike Lane & Storm Water

The multipurpose paved path project on Kinlock Road from Trans Canada Highway to JK Beauty Lane was completed in the summer of 2023 along with paving over 2 km of Trans Canada Trail through Stratford. Contractors recently completed the installation of a portion of the new paved multipurpose path at Stratford Community Campus. When completed, the path will connect Hollis Avenue to Bunbury Road, however, until the entire trail is complete, this section will not be open to the public. Work on the wooden boardwalk along the waterfront by the Hillsborough bridge will continue early into the new year. The Town recently adopted our updated Active Transportation plan to help guide staff and Council through the coming years. More information on active transportation work for 2024 will become available following the Town's budget process.

INFRASTRUCTURE DEPARTMENT

> Safety Services

The Town's Safety Services committee reviews lighting requests along with requests for speed and traffic signs, crosswalks and other calming devices. These traffic recommendations then need to be approved by the Province, who own the streets in Stratford. Our speed radar signs continue to provide valuable data to RCMP and Town. Several more traffic calming devices (speed humps and speed signs) were purchased or upgraded in 2023.


Maritime Electric will continue their program to replace high pressure sodium lights with LED. As part of their daily work, they replace lights with LED when these need repair or add new ones as and when requested by the Town.

> Snow Clearing On Roads, Sidewalks & Trails

Sidewalks and trails in Stratford are cleared of snow if they are along the public right of way, lead to public services or are groomed by the Recreation department in some of our parks for winter sports. The Town currently clears 30 km of sidewalk and trail and groom another 7 km. The groomed trails are through Fullerton's Creek and Conservation Park and Cotton Park, the trail from Langley Road to Rosebank Road through Kenny Park, and the trail from the Petro Can to Mason Road through Williams Gate Park.

All roads and streets in the Town of Stratford are owned and cleared by the Province of P.E.I. If you have any issues with the clearing of snow off streets, please direct them to the Department of Transportation's Highway Maintenance at 902-368-4770 or 902-368-5103. These include issues with storm water drainage that occur during heavy rain or melt events where ditches and storm water catch basins are overwhelmed or covered.

The Town would like to note that contractors in Stratford, like every community on the Island, make every effort to clear snow diligently. However, there are times when Provincial snow plow operators clearing our streets and private contractors clearing driveways, sidewalks etc. overlap, resulting in leftover snow. Please be patient and reach out to these contractors if you observe issues that require their attention.

WINTER DRIVING

Driving at fast speed is the main cause of winter collisions. Be sure to drive slowly and carefully on snow and ice-covered roads. Please DO NOT speed!

Winter driving also means accelerating and decelerating slowly. Do not attempt to move too quickly; apply gas slowly to regain traction and avoid skids and take the time to slow down for a stoplight or before entering turns. Remember, it takes longer to slow down on icy roads.

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

If an emergency happens, it may take emergency workers some time to reach you. These emergencies can be anything from power outages to storms, or blizzards in winter.

Having a 72-hours emergency kit can help you take care of yourself and your family until help reaches you!

Motorized vehicles are NOT permitted on any Town of Stratford trails at any time of year.

> The Building Bylaw and National Building Code

In the spring of 2020, the Town of Stratford adopted a new Building Bylaw (Bylaw #50), which included the adoption of the 2015 National Building Code and the 2017 National Energy Code of Canada for Buildings. The Building Bylaw is enforced through scheduled inspections during construction at various stages of completion. These inspections will verify work against the approved submitted plans and against the NBCC.

Any new application for a single detached development requires the following information:

- Development Application Form
- Utility Application Form
- Entrance Way Application Form
- Completed Deck Pamphlet (if using Helical Piles, an engineer stamped helical pile design is required)
- Building Plans, including, floor plans, elevations, and cross-section
- Truss Package, including, layout and individual truss design
- Site Plan/Grading Plan
- Letter of Authorization
- Additional information may be required

*** Please note that preliminary plans will no longer be accepted***

To ensure that your permit is ready in time for your project start date, please submit your complete application as early as possible to allow staff time to process it. Missing documents may cause delays in processing your permit.

> Official Plan Review Update

With numerous Town projects and plans being completed or adopted over the past few years, as well as amendments to the Stratford Official Plan and Subdivision and Development Bylaw #45, the Town is anticipating a major review of both documents in 2024. This review will not only capture these items but will examine extensively the increase in population growth in the Town, in coordination with the need for additional housing units and housing types to best address these items.

An important part of the Official Plan and Subdivision and Development Bylaw #45 review process will be extensive public engagement involving residents, developers, and stakeholders to promote open and respectful discussions, ensuring the public will play a role in modernizing both documents while contributing to the decision-making process.

Town planning staff will continue to provide updates on the progress of the Official Plan and Subdivision and Development Bylaw #45 review into 2024.

> Stratford Heroes Banners

The Town continued its tradition of honouring the Stratford heroes who served the country through its annual display of life-size banners in the lead up to Remembrance Day. > Wartime Tragedy in Stratford – Stratford Adds Fourth Interpretive Panel

The Town of Stratford received funding from The Community Museums Association of PEI for the Museum Development Grant. The funding was awarded for a new interpretive panel to tell the story of two Mi'kmaq Sisters who served in World War II.

On Indigenous Veterans Day, November 8, 2023, the Town unveiled the panel commemorating the wartime story of Rachael and Blanche Thomas from Stratford, then Southport. This event was attended by the family of the Thomas sisters. The interpretive panels are part of a series commemorating wartime acts of significance and serve to educate and honour veterans and their stories.

THINKING ABOUT A BACKYARD RINK THIS WINTER?

Be a good neighbour and if you plan to have a backyard rink this winter, we ask that you:



- Start by having a conversation with your neighbours. They may have concerns about lights, noise or other issues and addressing them from the beginning can go a long way to maintaining good relations.
- Be aware that rink flooding will affect your water bill and plan ahead for where your water will drain at the end of the season or during warm periods.
- Ensure your rink is within your property boundaries.
- Limit the number of users, especially in the early morning or later evening hours, to respect neighbours.
- And most importantly Have Fun!

PERMISSIONS TO USE TOWN FACILITIES

Groups and individuals who want to use Town facilities (which includes parks, playgrounds, and playing fields) for any reason must fill out an application and obtain permission from the recreation department. Town parks include all neighborhood parks and playgrounds as well as our major parks; Tea Hill Park, Pondside Park, Kinlock Park, Robert L. Cotton Memorial Park. and Fullerton's Creek Conservation Park. Town facilities include Stratford Emergency Services Centre, Stratford Town Centre, **MacNeill Community** Centre, Bunbury Rink **Building and Cotton** Park buildings. Town facilities are available to groups or individuals on a priority basis.

STRATFORD YOUTH CENTRE

The Stratford Youth Centre offers youth in Grades 5-12, a safe and supportive environment to participate in at the social and recreational centre, in various clubs, and special events to engage them. In turn, this encourages social growth and helps develop self-confidence and skills to prepare youth for their future. The Centre guides members to focus on volunteering, empowerment, community engagement and provides youth with an opportunity to voice their concerns about the community and show that they can really make a difference.



Membership allows access to the Youth Centre, numerous clubs and events, as well as an opportunity to participate in regular weekly member meetings. There is no cost for youth to join the Stratford Youth Centre. All members must help out with regular fundraising and volunteer opportunities within the community to maintain their membership. Parents are strongly encouraged to become involved with the Youth Centre and help out with the Centre's different events.



Members are asked to commit to a minimum of 20 volunteer hours with the Stratford Youth Centre every year to maintain their membership. This may include working at an event, assisting nonprofit organizations, and fundraising. All volunteer hours that are collected by members are recorded and can be used on a resume as a valuable life experience as they approach adulthood. Upcoming volunteer opportunities will be included in parent emails and weekly member meetings.



Stratford Youth Centre members are also eligible to earn special prizes and awards for their volunteer service with the Stratford Youth Centre.

> Outdoor Skating in Stratford Bunbury Rink (located off Clifton Rd.) and Pondside multipurpose surface (off Keppoch Rd.) are maintained over the winter months for skating and pick up hockey for youth & adults. Both locations are lit till 10pm daily for use.

Lanes at the track are for walking and running. Directions for walking and running change daily – these are posted everyday by the top of the stairs. We ask that users do not walk or run more than two feet wide so that faster walkers/runners may pass in the outside lane when traffic allows.

Young children MUST be directly supervised by an adult if using the gymnasium track. Fitness area (equipment only) is restricted to 15 years and older.

AWARD OBJECTIVES

Volunteers are - and always will be - an essential part of our community. This award is an annual award, which acknowledges and rewards a volunteer citizen who has made an outstanding contribution to our community.

The recipient will receive prizes (to be determined by Town Council) and the recipient will have his or her picture displayed at Stratford Town Center. The winner's name will also be engraved on a special trophy to honor each year's Volunteer of the Year. ALL NOMINEES will be recognized for their volunteer efforts and will receive an official acknowledgement on behalf of the Town of Stratford.

ELIGIBILITY

Volunteering is the act of people being involved in the improvement of their surroundings. Volunteer acts can occur within a structured organization (ex. volunteering at your library) or in an informal setting (ex. raking leaves for your elderly neighbor).

Those eligible to receive this award include any individual who performs volunteer act/acts (as defined above) within the Town of Stratford community. The purpose of this award is to focus on recognizing individual citizens; however the judging committee will also accept a submission that nominates two or more people together.

SELECTION PROCESS

The Town of Stratford will oversee the award, provide title, and the way in which it is presented. A committee under the direction of the Town's Recreation Committee will select the winner.

HOW TO SEND IN A SUBMISSION

Nomination Forms can be found on the Town's web page at *www.townofstratford.ca* or picked up at Stratford Town Center, 234 Shakespeare Drive. Completed nomination forms may be forwarded to the Town of Stratford's Recreation, Culture & Events Department at the address below.

All submission must be signed. The annual deadline for submissions is June 3. The award will be presented annually at Town of Stratford's Canada Day celebrations.

Award decisions will be selected based solely on the information provided, so it is important that all relevant information accompanies the nomination in order for the judging committee to make the best possible decision.


> Residential Tree Planting Program returns for a fourth season

> Become a Climate Tracker



> Gardening Tips from the Town's Horticulturist

Now that the cool weather has set in and the gardens are at rest, you may still want to be connected with nature in a certain way. Plus, it is always great for the mind, body and soul!

Although the leaves have fallen from most deciduous trees, we are still graced with the beauty of several native and non-native evergreen trees, even when the snow is deep. Evergreen trees keep their needles all year and bear cones of many different shapes and sizes. The life cycle of evergreens is like other plants, they start as seeds and then germinate into seedlings. While you are out for a walk, try identifying different evergreen species based on the cones. Most common native evergreens of PEI are Hemlock, Junipers, Pines (Red, White and Jack), Spruce (Red, White, Black), Eastern White Cedar and Balsam Fir.

Winter is another great time to get out and explore nature. A fun activity to do either alone, or with your family, is to find materials to bring into your home. This will continue to keep you connected to nature even when you are limited to time outdoors. Finding elements such as driftwood, dried flowers (Hydrangea, Sumac, Ornamental Pampas grass blooms), smooth rocks, shells and yellow or red twigs. Little changes and additions will surely bring the outside in. Try out your creativity and if you are extra creative use fallen branches to create useful houseware items such as cutting boards or small shelves/tables.

Ever try to identify animal tracks after fresh fallen snow? When out for a walk and you want to challenge yourself with a fun and educational activity, see how many different types of animals walked the same trail as you. Here, on PEI, you are likely to spot lots of tracks from foxes, snowshoe hares, covotes (hopefully you don't meet one!), squirrels (a little rarer this time of year), domestic animals (dogs and cats), as well as various bird tracks. Things to consider when attempting to identify animal tracks are; location, shape and size of footprints, dropped feathers or fur and possible starting and stopping points.

While searching for animal tracks is interesting, spotting birds that are active in the winter is also fascinating! The Government of PEI website has

a list of many common birds that can be spotted during the winter months. I'm sure many of you have seen European Starlings, Woodpeckers, Downy Goldfinches. American Dark-eved Juncos, as well as hearing the melody of songs performed by Blue Jays, Mourning Doves and Black-capped Chickadees. Along with the birds mentioned here, there are numerous others. See how many more you can add to the list and my hope for you is to enjoy the days of Winter!

Town of Stratford is a welcoming and inclusive community, and in this edition of Town Talk, we would like to recognize our **Ukrainian** community members and celebrate their rich culture.


Ukraine, the second-largest country in Europe by landmass, is twice the size of Italy and slightly smaller than the state of Texas. The country's fertile plains, called steppes, are ideal for growing crops, including wheat. Ukraine is sometimes called the "breadbasket of Europe." Despite being one of Europe's largest countries in size, Ukraine's population of about 43 million people makes it less populated than smaller European countries such as Germany and France. Most Ukrainians are Christians, following a branch known as Eastern Orthodoxy.

Well-known dishes in Ukraine include borscht, a hot beetroot soup traditionally served with garlic doughnuts; *varenyky*, dumplings stuffed with fillings such as potatoes, sauerkraut, or cottage cheese; *holubtsi*, cabbage rolls stuffed with boiled rice or meat; and *deruni*, also known as potato pancakes.

Ukrainians are famous for their warm hospitality and pride in keeping their traditions. One of the most favourite holidays in Ukraine is Christmas. Since 2017, Christmas has become a public holiday in Ukraine, and after the beginning of the full-scale Russian

A lesser-known fact is that the world-famous Christmas song "Carol of the Bells", also known as *Shchedryk*, is a Ukrainian composition. The Ukrainian composer, Mykola Leontovych, spent more than 20 years creating this masterpiece. In 1916, *Shchedryk* was performed for the first time by the choir of Kyiv University. Then, in 1919, the head of the Ukrainian People's Republic Symon Petliura sent the Ukrainian Republican Chapel on a world tour to demonstrate the beauty and power of Ukrainian culture and identity.



The premiere concert of the tour took place on May 11th, 1919, at the National Theater in Prague. On October 5th, 1921, *Shchedryk* was performed at Carnegie Hall in New York and the performance was a huge success! Even though Ukrainians still had to survive the horrors of *Holodomor* (The Great Famine of 1932–1933), genocide, and 70 years of Soviet occupation, it was an example of the first cultural diplomacy of Ukraine and thanks to the choir, the world began to learn about Ukraine.

- Publishing an ongoing series of course material allow for the general public, planning board and council members to learn more about the planning process in an open, engaging and easily accessible format at their own space.
- Launched two virtual platforms under "Build Your Town" to give the community a way to play out different development scenarios.

PERMISSIONS TO USE TOWN FACILITIES

Groups and individuals who want to use Town facilities (which includes parks, playgrounds, and playing fields) for any reason must fill out an application and obtain permission from the recreation department. Town parks include all neighborhood parks and playgrounds as well as our major parks; Tea Hill Park, Pondside Park, Kinlock Park, Robert L. Cotton Memorial Park, and Fullerton's Creek Conservation Park. Town facilities include Stratford Emergency Services Centre, Stratford Town Centre, MacNeill Community Centre, Bunbury Rink Building and Cotton Park buildings. Town facilities are available to groups or individuals on a priority basis.

Hello everyone!

As I write this, we have just finished the first week in the Fall legislature. There are twenty bills that the government hopes to pass. Capital budget for 2024/25 is another priority of this sitting. One thing I have heard over and over is the concerns regarding our population growth and how we need the infrastructure to support it. I do hope that in this capital plan you see that we are working on that.

A significant portion of the capital plan is the Stratford High School. The town is doing a great job in showing the progress being made on the Community Campus. It is exciting to see it take shape.

Housing got a boost this fall with the HST rebate on new rental housing. This program provides a full rebate of the provincial portion of the HST (10%) on qualified projects. It can be used in conjunction with other programs (i.e., Housing Challenge Fund) to support housing projects.

We released the public accounts for the 2002/23 fiscal year. We came in with a \$14.4 surplus, net debt of \$2,450.8 million which is 27.2 percent of GDP. We are in a good fiscal position. Our strong economy has performed despite the challenges with high inflation and high interest rates. Inflation has eased; however, it still remains high, and it is our job in these times to find ways to support Islanders. The basic personal amount will take another step January 1st to \$13,500 and tax rates on lower brackets will be reduced. \$10/day childcare will also be another significant savings for families in 2024.

I encourage you to check out a new release from the College of Physicians and Surgeons on November 2nd (https://www.cpspei. ca/public-information-release-november-2-2023/). Changes to legislation have enabled them to implement new policies, allowing for expansion of eligibility criteria. They report receiving 307 applications so far this year, 188 of which were through the Atlantic Registry; 276 completed, 6 withdrew their application/expired, and 25 are currently incomplete. Of the 276 complete applications, they approved and issued registration to 275 physicians, which allows them to practice in PEI. This is up from 133 applications in 2022 and 118 in 2021.

Please reach out at any time. I have a district office set up in the Town Hall and encourage you to stop by anytime. My assistant Danielle is there every day from 9-3 and I come in on Mondays and Fridays if possible.



> In Tune With Birds



Birds, with their acute sensitivity to environmental changes, play pivotal roles in our ecosystems. They serve both as indicators of ecological health and actively contribute to its well-being, offering valuable insights and painting a picture of the overall health of our environment.

We are thrilled to announce that, thanks to the generous support of the PEI Wildlife Conservation Fund grant, we are embarking on a bird survey project. The project will include a combination of bird identification through both song and visual characteristics in order to gather baseline data on the presence and distribution of various species within our watershed.

Through these surveys we hope to gain insights into local bird populations and monitor their seasonal fluctuations. We also hope to learn more about the distribution of at-risk species, such as the Bobolink (Dolichonyx oryzivorus) and Eastern Wood-Pewee (Contopus virens).

By establishing this baseline, we can better identify measures to enhance the avian environment and ensure the well-being of our feathered friends.

Citizens on Patrol–Stratford (COPS) is a volunteer program designed to encourage residents of Stratford to contribute to the safety of their community. Volunteers are proud to support the excellent work of RCMP members in Stratford, by serving as an "extra set of eyes and ears" and reporting any observed suspicious activity. Committed to crime prevention, COPS volunteers patrol by car,

in pairs, in residential and business areas for one or two threehour shifts a month on Friday and Saturday nights. COPS will also patrol on occasions such as prom nights and Halloween, and support Town of Stratford events and safety initiatives. To be eligible to participate in the program, COPS volunteers must be at least eighteen years of age, undergo a criminal record check, and complete an






