MAYOR'S MESSAGE



New Year Greetings!

I hope you had a peaceful and joyous holiday season and that 2022 is a very happy and healthy year for everyone.

Let me begin by offering a warm welcome to our new Chief Administrative Officer which we will introduce to residents in the next edition of Town Talk. At this time, I would like to acknowledge and thank Robert Hughes, who after 22 years of exemplary service to Stratford, retired at the end of 2021. Council, staff, and residents owe Robert a tremendous debt of gratitude for his vision and leadership during his distinguished tenure with the Town and I extend heartfelt thanks to Robert for everything he has done and wish him all the best in his retirement.

- Since September's last update, several Town initiatives have advanced significantly:
- Regarding the new high school, we are grateful to the Province for their continued commitment to build the school on the Community Campus as noted in their fall capital budget. We are completing the Community Campus conceptual layout and have applied for funding to construct the roadway, water, sewer, and stormwater systems in 2022.
 - I would like to thank the many residents who provided input to the waterfront park plan. The latest version of the plan is available on the Town's website. We hope to complete Phase 1 in 2022, which will consist of building a boardwalk and lookouts.
 - The Annual Resident Survey will be released in late January. I encourage all residents to complete it as your views on key issues are important considerations in all Council and staff decisions. This past fall, a survey of Town businesses was completed. We were pleased to see that 84% rated the Town as an excellent or good place to do business. Thank you to all who participated, and for choosing to #ThinkStratford and locate your business here.
 - Development of the Town's 2022-23 budget is well underway. Please watch for a public opportunity to comment on the draft budget in late February or early March.
 - There has been phenomenal interest and success in the Switch Stratford Program which is helping homeowners to make the switch to greener solutions while saving on their energy costs. Visit the Town's website or www.switchstratford.ca for more information.

The Gray Group's Crossroads development plan demonstrates their confidence in Stratford through the investment of close to \$1Billion which is proposed to transform our Town core and represent the next generation of the Town of Stratford. Public meetings will be held to review any proposed changes to the Official Plan and Zoning and Development Bylaw.

In closing, let's look forward with optimism and hope to longer days, warmer sunshine, and a healthier environment as we continue to work together to make Stratford the best community possible!

WATER USE DURING PROLONGED POWER OUTAGE

In the event of a prolonged power outage, we ask Stratford Utility customers to limit their water use as while water will remain available, the Town's pumping stations will need to be serviced manually since they are not equipped with backup generators.

This can be a slow process that requires a continuous loop by staff to visit each pumping station and manually empty them. Therefore, the least amount of water that goes into the sewer system during a power outage is easier for our system and staff.

> Utility Projects

Subdivisions

Infrastructure staff are busy closing out 2021 projects while preparing for a busy 2022 season. Ongoing Stratford Utility projects from 2021 include sewer pipe lining to reduce inflow and infiltration, upgrades to our Corish, Bayside, and Pondsides sewer lift stations and upgrades to the SCADA communications system which remotely monitors our sewer lift and water stations.

The Utility added water and sewer infrastructure from three new subdivisions in 2021 which means that Utility staff now monitor and maintain a water and sewer system comprised of 87 kilometers of sewer main, 1246 sewer manholes, 28 sewer lift stations, 4 water stations and a reservoir, 82 kilometers of water main, 618 water main valves, 274 hydrants and valves, and finally, 3741 residential and commercial water meters.

As development continues in 2022, several subdivision extensions and new subdivisions are in the concept and/or design phase. Staff are busy removing Christmas decorations, preparing equipment for the summer, and completing maintenance and repairs as needed inside our buildings.

Wastewater Treatment Delivery System

Stratford's wastewater is now being pumped to Charlottetown for treatment since February 2021. Contractors have been busy decommissioning our lagoons and preparing the land for our new waterfront park. Work will continue this spring.

> Public Works

The Town's maintenance building received a new heat pump and steel roof in 2021. Other work includes construction of

a dry storage building which began in December 2021 and will be completed by the summer, access risers added to our septic tank at Tea Hill Park, new sidewalk installed around the Stratford Emergency Services Centre, and the Town added a new dump trailer and used water truck to our inventory. Four electric vehicle charging stations were added in 2021 through a partnership with Maritime Electric with the Town currently having three charging stations at Stratford Town Hall, one at Stratford Emergency Services Centre, and one on Sheppard Drive.

Sidewalks, Trails Bike Lane, and Storm Water

In the fall of 2021, contractors completed the paved multi-purpose path on Keppoch Road. While the path has been opened since November 2021 and will be cleared of snow this winter, reinstatement will continue in 2022. This 2.3 km path was the largest active transportation project to date in Stratford. The Town is budgeting for additional multi-use paths in the 2022-23 budget.

The Province completed the multi-purpose path across the Hillsborough bridge as well as the Trans Canada trail connection from Fullerton's Park to Mt Herbert Road in 2021. Users can now travel from Charlottetown to Wood Islands on an active transportation system. The province has paved over four kilometers of streets this year. Our thanks go to the Province of PEI for their continued support of projects throughout Stratford.

Please note that it is illegal to discharge any storm water, surface water, water from sump pumps, roof run-off, surface drainage, subsurface drainage, foundation drainage, or water used for heating or cooling into our sewer system.

Safety Services

The Town's Safety Services committee reviews lighting requests along with requests for speed and traffic signs, crosswalks, and other traffic calming devices. These traffic recommendations then need to be approved by the Province who owns the streets in Stratford. Our speed radar signs continue to provide valuable data to RCMP and Town. Several more traffic calming devices (speed humps and speed signs) were purchased and used in 2021 with a plan to add more of these devices in 2022.

Maritime Electric will continue their program to replace high pressure sodium lights with LED throughout Stratford.

As part of their daily work, they also replace lights with LED as they need repair or add new lights as requested by the Town.

Snow Clearing of Roads, Sidewalks and Trails

Sidewalks, along with select trails that are along the public right of way, which lead to public services or are groomed by the Recreation department in some of our parks for walking or skiing in Stratford, are cleared of snow.

The Town would like to note that contractors in Stratford, like every community on the Island, make every effort to clear snow diligently. However, there are times when Provincial snow plow operators' clearing our streets, and private contractors' clearing driveways, sidewalks, etc. overlap, resulting in leftover snow. Please be patient and reach out to these contractors if you observe issues that require their attention.

DID YOU KNOW?

All roads and streets in the Town of Stratford are owned and cleared of snow by the Province of PEI. If you find any issues with the clearing of snow off the streets, please direct them to the Department of Transportation at 902-368-4770 or 902-368-4750.

This includes issues with storm water drainage that occur during heavy rain or melt events where ditches and storm water catch basins are overwhelmed or covered.



> The Building Bylaw and National Building Code


In the spring of 2020, the Town of Stratford adopted a new Building Bylaw (Bylaw #50), which included the adoption of the 2015 National Building Code and the 2017 National Energy Code of Canada for Buildings. The Building Bylaw is enforced through scheduled inspections during construction at various stages of completion. These inspections will verify work against the approved submitted plans and against the NBCC.

Any new application for a single detached development requires the following information:

- Development Application Form
- Utility Application Form
- Entrance Way Application Form
- Completed Deck Pamphlet (if using Helical Piles, an engineer stamped helical pile design is required)
- Building Plans; including, floor plans, elevations, and cross-section
- Truss Package; including, layouts and individual truss design
- Site Plan/Grading Plan
- Letter of Authorization
- Additional information may be required

*** Please note that preliminary plans will no longer be accepted ***

To ensure that your permit is ready in time for your project start date, please submit your complete application as early as possible, while allowing enough time for staff to process it.



> Bylaw information

> Official Plan Review Update

Now that Stratford Town Council have adopted the Stratford Waterfront Core Area Plan, Town staff are working to review the recommended changes to the Town's Official Plan and Zoning Bylaw.

The Waterfront Core Area and Town Centre Core Area are both proposing changes from the original proposal that was put forward by the Core Area Plan completed in 2006. As a result, it is now recommended that the Town review the Mason Road Core Area as well as part of the 2021 Official Plan Review.

This would ensure that any revisions that may be necessary to complement proposed changes in the remaining core area are completed at the same time. There would be emphasis on areas that could contain mixed use rather than exclusively commercial or residential development.

Public consultation on proposed changes to the Official Plan is expected to take place in 2022.

PLANNING, DEVELOPMENT AND HERITAGE

> Stratford Honour Roll Project



The purpose of this project was to ensure that those who died while serving our country during times of war are not forgotten. This project recognizes and honours 10 soldiers who made the ultimate sacrifice; those who did not return from overseas conflicts or died at home as a result of the injuries received in those conflicts. This project has also made the existing cenotaph

fully accessible to the public so that it can be used as an engagement piece for Veterans, Armed Forces members, and residents. It will also serve as a community learning piece for our youth. It is intended to be a place that people can gather throughout the year for remembrance and reflection. Two Interpretive Panels have also been created by the Town of Stratford Heritage Committee to tell the story of these 10 individuals, one each for WWI and WWII.



> Development Permits

From January to October 2021, the Planning Department has issued a total of 208 development permits. The following Table shows a summary of development activities between January and October 2021.

Designed for youth a minimum age of 11 (or completion of Grade 5), this course teaches the skills necessary to care for infants, toddlers and preschoolers. It emphasizes safety, dealing with emergencies, and first aid basics, along with hands-on practice that will help build confidence.

Course materials include a student activity book, a certificate suitable for framing, and a wallet-size certificate.



STRATFORD YOUTH CENTRE

The Stratford Youth Centre offers youth in Grades 5-12, a safe and supportive environment to participate at the social and recreational centre, in various clubs, and at special events. In turn, this encourages social growth and helps develop self-confidence and skills to prepare youth for their future. The Centre guides members to focus on volunteering, empowerment, community engagement and provides youth with an opportunity to voice their concerns about the community and show that they can really make a difference.



Membership allows access to the Youth Centre, numerous clubs and events, as well as an opportunity to participate in regular weekly member meetings. There is no cost for youth to join the Stratford Youth Centre however all members must help out with regular fundraising and volunteer opportunities within the community to maintain their membership. Parents are strongly encouraged to become involved with the Youth Centre and help with our different events as well.



Youth members are asked to commit to a minimum of 20 volunteer hours with the Stratford Youth Centre every year to maintain their membership. This may include working at an event, assisting nonprofit organizations, and

fundraising. All volunteer hours that are collected by members are recorded and can be used on a resume as a valuable life experience as they approach adulthood. Upcoming volunteer opportunities will be included in parent emails and weekly member meetings. Stratford Youth Centre members are also eligible to earn special prizes and awards for their volunteer service with the Stratford Youth Centre.

> Permissions to use Town Facilities

Groups and individuals who want to use Town facilities for any reason must fill out an application and obtain permission from the recreation department. Town parks include all neighborhood parks and playgrounds as well as our major parks; Tea Hill Park, Pondside Park, Kinlock Park, Robert L. Cotton Memorial Park, and Fullerton's Creek Conservation Park.

Town facilities include the Stratford Town Centre, MacNeill Community Centre, Bunbury Rink Building and Cotton Park buildings. Town facilities are available to groups or individuals on a priority basis.



> Town Centre Gymnasium

The Stratford Town Centre is open for Stratford residents to use seven days a week. The centre is equipped with a gymnasium, walking track, fitness centre, multi-purpose meeting rooms, change rooms, stage, and kitchen. Residents are welcome to use the fitness centre and walking track any time the building is open. Please check our social media or call 902-569-6250 to inquire about current COVID-19 protocols or restrictions.

To book any of our meeting rooms or gymnasium for private use, please contact the recreation office at 902-569-6250. We ask that you please sign in and out with the gym attendants when using our facility.



> Stratford Gymnasium Track Direction and Rules

Lanes at the track are for walking and running. Directions for walking/running change daily - these are posted everyday by the top of the stairs. We ask that people do not walk or run more than two feet wide so that faster walkers/runners may pass in the outside lane when traffic allows.

Young children MUST be directly supervised by an adult if using the gymnasium track. Fitness area (equipment only) is restricted to 15 years and older.

Volunteering is the act of people being involved in the improvement of their surroundings. Volunteer acts can occur within a structured organization (ex. volunteering at your library) or in an informal setting (ex. raking leaves for your elderly neighbor).

Those eligible to receive this award include any individual who performs volunteer act/acts (as defined above) within the Town of Stratford community. The purpose of this award is to focus on recognizing individual citizens; however the judging committee will also accept a submission that nominates two or more people together.

SELECTION PROCESS

The Town of Stratford will oversee the award, provide title, and the way in which it is presented. A committee under the direction of the Town's Recreation Committee will select the winner.

HOW TO SEND IN A SUBMISSION

Nomination Forms can be found on the Town's web page at www.townofstratford.ca or picked up at Stratford Town Center, 234 Shakespeare Drive. Completed nomination forms may be forwarded to the Town of Stratford's Recreation, Culture & Events Department at the address below.

All submission must be signed. The annual deadline for submissions is June 3. The award will be presented annually at Town of Stratford's Canada Day celebrations.

Award decisions will be selected based solely on the information provided, so it is important that all relevant information accompanies the nomination in order for the judging committee to make the best possible decision.

TOWN EVENTS & INITIATIVES

> Residential Tree Planting Program

Last spring, the Town of Stratford launched a pilot program to help residents plant a good-quality, large native tree in their front yard. The program was a success, and 100 mature trees were planted throughout Stratford, including tree species like red maple, red oak, and white birch. Each tree was planted in the front yard so that, once full grown, they will provide shade and other benefits to street users and the entire neighbourhood. In 2021, the pilot program was funded by the PEI Climate Challenge Fund, and due to the initial success, the Town intends to run the program again this year. Sign up for the Town's e-newsletter to find out more about the upcoming 2022 Residential Tree Planting Program. Details will be shared in the coming months.



> Stratford Switch Program

In July, the Town launched a new program to help residents make energy improvements to their home, such as installing solar or increasing insulation, called "Switch Stratford". The goal of the program is to remove barriers for residents looking to make the switch to renewable energy and/or energy efficiency. Through the program, residents can apply to receive support through the planning stages, a free home energy audit, 0% financing on the cost of the project, and help to coordinate rebates. Interest in the program so far has been higher than expected, and over 200 residents of Stratford have already reached out to the program, and many have completed projects. The program operates with a small administration fee that is based on the cost of the total project and is also available to residents of Charlottetown and Wolfville, NS. > Community Gardens Expansion

This fall, the Stratford Area Watershed Improvement Group and the Rotary Club of Charlottetown Royalty teamed up to assist the Town in expanding the always-popular Community Gardens. Sixteen new garden plots were built and installed and will be ready for use in Spring 2022. The gardens now offer 87 plots, making it one of the largest community gardens in PEI! - The most important festivals include *Spring Festival* (also known

as *Chinese New Year*), *Lantern Festival*, *Qingming* or *Tomb Sweeping Festival*, *Dragon Boat Festival*, and *Mid-Autumn Festival*.


- Chinese place great importance on family and family structure. In many families, grandparents tend to live with their children even after they are married and have their own children, and children will look after their parents once they are married and working.

- Tea is the national beverage of China. Having a pot of tea when visitors come around is the typical way for Chinese people to welcome them.

- When you're visiting a Chinese home, it's customary to take off your shoes before entering their home; most homes will have guest slippers that you can slip on.

- Respect is important in Chinese culture. You will often see Chinese people do a slight bow when greeting someone and greet elders first as a sign of respect. In fact, elders take the lead at dinner; they sit first and get served first, and families will often wait until their elders take their first bite before the rest of them begins eating.

- If you notice Chinese people accepting business cards or gifts with two hands, it's because they are showing respect. Similarly, if you're receiving a business card from them, make sure to glance at it for a few seconds and tuck it away in a chest pocket, never in your back pocket (which is a sign of disrespect in Chinese culture).

Over 1,200 trees were planted along streams and coastlines, 26 bags of bittersweet nightshade were removed from riparian zones, 8 beaches were cleaned twice, and 6 brush mats were installed to help remove sediment from the stream to improve fish habitat. Also, water quality monitoring took place weekly in ten locations. Overall, it has been another successful field season!

As we celebrate this holiday season and turn the calendar to 2022, it is a great time to reflect on a year that has given us the opportunity to reunite with family, gather with friends and resume some of our normal activities.



The pandemic has taught me that empathy is essential. Throughout the past two years every single person has a story of some way the pandemic affected their health and happiness. We are in a time of healing when we need the most support from our healthcare system; a system that is overburdened, aging and needs our attention.

In the fall sitting of the Legislature, I raised a lot of the concerns that our frontline healthcare workers are dealing with. Working short staffed creates a stressful work environment but staff shortages are a symptom of greater issues. Excessive workloads, workplace violence, low wages and lack of work/life balance have caused shortages in many areas within our healthcare system. I will continue to press government to make necessary changes to address the actual issues, not just the symptoms. This is more than just press releases and platitudes. Our healthcare workers need capacity built into a system that is struggling. Islanders need our healthcare workers to be healthy and safe. I believe that we can improve the healthcare system, but it will take listening to the workers.

I was proud to move a motion this sitting to improve access to preventative pelvic floor healthcare, especially for women. Many in our community do not know what kinds of preventative care is available for pelvic floors. This motion passed unanimously. We also passed a motion to implement a pilot to allow pharmacists to work their full scope of practice on PEI. The intent is to provide more points of access for primary healthcare so more Islanders can get the care they need.

I love volunteering in the community as it gives me the opportunity to connect with so many residents. This fall, I started helping at the Birchwood breakfast program every Tuesday morning and get to greet the Grade 7s. They are a great group of kids. This year I am also leading the Stratford Sparks and Brownies and love being back with these curious and inquisitive kids.

I will be continuing my office hours at Stratford Town Centre in the new year with a slight change in time; Monday morning at Stratford Town Centre from 9:30 - 11:00 am. To book an appointment, call (902) 620-3977 or send me an email at mlbeatonMLA@assembly.pe.ca.

To help keep you safe on the road this winter, the RCMP are sharing some winter driving tips to help you prepare:


- Drive for the road conditions. Slow down when conditions are poor.
- Always ensure that you plan for your commute ahead of time, especially if inclement weather is in the forecast.
- Make sure that your vehicle is equipped with tires appropriate for the season, and that they have plenty of tread.

- Do not use cruise control when driving on any snow or ice-covered roads.
- Always clean all snow and ice off your entire vehicle prior to driving.

The public plays an important role in helping to keep roadways safe. If you suspect an impaired or dangerous driver, please call 9-1-1 immediately in a safe manner. Providing as much information as possible regarding the vehicle, driver, location, and direction of travel can help police get these drivers off the road.

STRATFORDS OF THE WORLD

Although the Stratfords of the World Reunion committee in Ontario is hoping to host the reunion in late July 2022 (after postponing 2 consecutive years), there are still many unknowns regarding COVID-19 for travelers and therefore, the committee has deferred making a decision until at least mid-December whether to host or postpone the reunion.



The other Stratfords (Great Britain, United States, New Zealand, Australia, Ontario) along with PEI have had two recent ZOOM meetings for updates in each of our communities, to lend support to the Ontario committee, and to discuss the future of the Stratfords of the World. Upon hearing the reports of COVID-19 cases, hospitalizations, and deaths in the other Stratfords, their states and countries, it certainly re-enforces how fortunate we are in PEI (less than 400 cases, 2 hospitalizations and no deaths at the time of writing this report on November 20), still we ALL must remain vigilant to protect ourselves and our loved ones.

Another topic at our ZOOM meetings was the future of the Stratfords of the World. Many of the founding members are aging and have some health concerns which make travelling, especially overseas, more cumbersome. And it seems to be difficult to get new members interested in participating. In the 1990s, the reunions were a cultural exchange of music and drama participants between Stratford, Ontario and Stratford, Connecticut. Within a very short time, it evolved into a broader mandate so that delegates no longer needed to be participants in choirs, bands, or drama clubs. In

other words, although 'the arts' are still very prominent in the weeklong cultural events at the reunions, it is more 'attendance' rather than 'performance' by delegates that is the focus. In fact, attendance is optional at the scheduled events (bus tours, theatrical performances, luncheons, banquets, historical sites, etc.) but most take advantage of these events as they are provided at no cost, and they are opportunities to experience local culture and mingle with delegates. Participants are billeted with local families which is not only cost effective but provides opportunities to experience 'living' in a different Stratford. However, it is optional and occasionally delegates will choose to stay with relatives or in a hotel (at their own expense).




